- Click on “Student Services & Financial Aid”
- Click on “Registration”
- Click on “Add/Drop Classes”
- Choose the correct term- Spring 2025 Semester
- Enter CRN numbers and hit “Submit Changes”
If you need to find an additional class, click on “Class Search”.
- To see all of the classes offered, click on the top “Subject”, drag through the list. You can then refine your search to look by department, LAS requirement, etc.
 - Click on “Course Search”
 - This will bring up all of the class offerings for the term.
 - NOTE: Classes that are at the 5000-level or above are graduate courses and you may not sign up for them.
 - Closed classes have “C” on the left, open classes have box.
 - To sign up for the class, click on the box and a check will be inserted.
 - Click on “Register” at the bottom of the page.
 - If the class will work with your schedule, it will be added.
 - If there is a problem (time conflict, prerequisite) you will see a red error box.
- To confirm you are registered, return to the Registration Menu and select “Student Detail Schedule.”

AR 2990 Drawing II: The Layered Image

This is an Intermediate/ Advanced level course in drawing will explore the roles of mixed media and mixed imagery in contemporary drawing practice. Students will learn the technical means of building images and how meaning emerges in layers and in juxtapositions. Numerous artistic precedents will be examined and various media will be engaged. Specific issues centering on the role of mixed media drawing in the advent of Modernism and Post-modernism will be discussed with implications extending into contemporary studio practices. Prerequisite AR1610

AR 2990 Text to Printing

Combining written text with various printmaking techniques (letter press, relief, silk screen, and photo printmaking), offers students an innovative studio-based process of engagement due to the multiple layers of artistic intent and methods found in blended genre creative work. In addition to creating individual studio-based projects, students will examine historical and contemporary contexts of text and printmaking techniques and apply critical, analytical, and creative skills to their work.

AR 3990 Sp Tp: Community Mural Art

Mural painting is a historic and time-honored context for artists to convey ideas and imagery to a wide audience- creating images on a large scale, in a public location, and for a relatively larger public. The course will engage students in the entire process of approaching and working with public and private clients who are sponsoring or commissioning hypothetical, and when possible, actual murals for the class to execute. Students will develop proposals and scale models to be submitted to clients for review and approval, and will practice the processes and skills involved in the execution of approved commissions.

AR 3990 World of Games

Games offer a powerful learning environment while engaging the participant in a role-play and offering the opportunity to take on different perspectives and actions to address the issues. Through Forge of Empires' gameplay, students will translate the game-based complex thinking skills to communicate ideas and develop competence on issues of global significance such as international trade and global resources, poverty and hunger, climate and environmental challenges, world conflicts, world cultures and local concerns, and globalization.

BU 3990 Multicultural Marketing

As the United States becomes more diverse, it is important for marketers to understand how to account for cultural differences in their marketing plans to compete in a dynamic and competitive environment. In this course, students will gain insights into cultural markets and explore their unique characteristics to build a successful marketing campaign. Through case studies and real-world examples,

students will explore a variety of marketing strategies that will resonate with the multicultural consumers.

CH 2990 Forensic Science

This course will cover topics in forensic science, including applying the scientific method to forensic analysis; the practice and principles of crime scene investigation; and the proper handling of physical & trace evidence. Students will gain experiential knowledge of forensic science through laboratory experiments. Experiments will range from fingerprint and blood analysis to techniques that are based on genetic and chemical analysis of samples. This course fulfills the LAS 5 requirement.

CJ 2990 Federal Crimes and Procedure

This is a course will present an inquiry into, and understanding of, federal criminal law and procedure. We will work directly with the same materials used by federal agents, federal prosecutors, defense attorneys, and judges. We will consider the same issues that federal law enforcement agents and prosecutors deal with in investigating and prosecuting violations of federal crimes. The topics we will cover include a survey of federal criminal offenses as outlined in Title 18, of the United States Code (the main criminal code of the Federal Government), as well as procedural issues such motions to suppress, grand jury investigations, charging, first appearances, change of pleas, trial and sentencing. We will also examine such issues as handling cooperators and undercover investigations, utilizing electronic surveillance, gathering cooperating witness evidence, dealing with problems that arise in the course of federal investigations, and bringing it all together through a prosecution and the use of gathered evidence at trial and sentencing.

CJ 2990 Counter Intelligence Theory and Practice

This course addresses the question: What is Counterintelligence? A field veiled in secrecy, mystery, and intrigue, this class will introduce students to the theory and practice of counterintelligence as "an [intelligence] activity aimed at protecting an agency's intelligence program(s) against an opposition's intelligence service." The class will expose students to historical perspectives, theoretical perspectives, national security, military, law enforcement, and business/corporate intelligence issues. Students will be introduced to the objectives and guidelines of the United States counterintelligence discipline and be provided examples of the investigative, defensive, offensive, and collection activities of the counterintelligence function. The student will learn selected historical lessons, Counterintelligence Fundamentals, Counterintelligence Theory, the differences between defensive and offensive counterintelligence activities and their applications, and the Ethics of the discipline. Readings, videos, discussion board posts, and written assignments will be used to ensure students grasp critical counterintelligence principles.

CO 3990 Topics: NEC-TV

This course introduces students to television news production. Students will work as a group to conduct newsroom meetings and to produce and record a weekly NEC-TV newscast. The course will explore theory and best practices for studio

management, lighting, videography, editing, writing, producing, and on-air talent. May be repeated for credit. Prerequisite(s): CO 3990 Broadcast Writing. 4 Credits.

CO 3990 Topics: Sports Reporting

This course will give students an opportunity to understand how the basic techniques of broadcast news journalism apply to sports reporting. Students will apply news gathering skills, using video and sound, to construct sports stories. This course will allow students to write sports copy and learn how to deliver it to an audience. Students will also get an introduction on how to “go live” and deliver reports in front of an audience. The class will also understand the importance of athletic competition and how it often bleeds over into the world of social activism. Students should have a basic understanding of sports before taking this class.

CW 2990 Text to Printing

Combining written text with various printmaking techniques (letter press, relief, silk screen, and photo printmaking), offers students an innovative studio-based process of engagement due to the multiple layers of artistic intent and methods found in blended genre creative work. In addition to creating individual studio-based projects, students will examine historical and contemporary contexts of text and printmaking techniques and apply critical, analytical, and creative skills to their work.

DES 2990 Sp Tp: Branding & Identity

Students combine their knowledge of typography, image-making, problem solving techniques and conceptual skills developed in Principles Design I and II to create integrated solutions to sophisticated design and communication problems. One large project will be focused on during the semester, that will span a variety of application methods. Emphasis on complex identity systems and cross-platform application.

HS 2990 Britain ca. 500 to 1066 – Course description coming soon

HS 2990 Rise and Fall of Renaissance Florence

This course will consider the Italian Renaissance as it unfolded over 150 years, centered upon Quattrocento (fifteenth-century) Florence. It will analyze the broader political, social and religious changes taking place in the contemporary West through the microcosm of Florentine history. A series of in-depth case studies of the city’s most illustrious artists, writers, philosophers, and scientists will enhance the narrative historical journey.

KI 2990 Theory of OE & Ropes Crse Mgt

This course examines the theoretical basis of experiential and outdoor education including the education, psychological, and historical underpinnings. Time spent in this course is spent in classroom setting and on the ropes course. Emphasis is given to each students philosophical development of leadership and education. The theories of outdoor education and leadership are researched, explored, and discussed in this course. The course also explores and experiments how Ropes

Courses are Educational and Therapeutic tools used in programming for developing efficacy, communication, and team building. Students will participate in extensive group experience. Successful completion of this course prepares students to design and lead experiential education activities both indoors and out. Prerequisites: KI 1110 or SM 1510 or ED 1000 , Minimum of 24 credits earned *Offered every spring Credits: 4*

LAS 1110 Are We Living in The Matrix?

“The Matrix” raises the question: Is any of this real? Using “The Matrix” as a starting point, through philosophy, art and religion, the course examines humanity’s relationship to a nature which may or may not even be out there, and traces the implications for both alternatives. Along with covering other works of sci-fi that carry similar themes, the course examines the philosophers whose ideas were the inspiration for The Matrix, such as Socrates, Plato and Descartes. The main assignments will be project-based and will mirror real things that real people do in the real world (if there is one, that is). Students will gain competencies in understanding core philosophical concepts and their impact on humanity, nature, and the environment, explaining these concepts by adapting them to new audiences, and relating them to real-world issues and problems.

LAS 1110 Will Climate Change My Life?

As we enter the social and environmental disruptions of a rapidly changing climate, what is, and will be, the impact on you? This course is designed to help students understand a global environmental problem in the context of their own lives. To reach this point students will research and discuss the scientific method, climate research techniques, and the current predictions of climate change impacts on a global, national and regional scale. We will explore the inherent social issues of a global event including climate refugees, social justice, economic disruption, and cultural change and how these could impact students. Given a background in the current science, students’ final project will be to design a lifestyle concept map. It will serve as a visual framework of the impact of climate change on an individual, and an outline of behavior that could reduce greenhouse gasses and mitigate the impact of climate change.

LAS 1120 Civil Rights & The Graphic Nvl

Since the days of cave paintings and hieroglyphs, humans have been using the visual storytelling conventions of sequential art to recount and preserve their stories. In this course, we will read four graphic novels from four individuals of various race, religion, gender and sexual orientation to see how their experiences in American society compare and contrast with one another, as well as our own. In this course, we will read first-hand accounts from members of historically marginalized groups and examine how their experience of American freedom might not have afforded them the same human rights as others, and the means by which they’ve had to go about attaining equal rights in our democratic society. By viewing each of these unique experiences, we will also examine how the various cultures, religions, and communities that exist in the US work together to create our diverse American culture and society.

LAS 1120 Civil Rights and Star Trek

Launched amidst the civil rights movement of the 1960's, Star Trek boldly went where no other TV show had gone before by placing a black female officer on the bridge crew of Starfleet's flagship vessel, and rightly earned its place in our nation's civil rights history. From the 1960's to today, Star Trek continues to explore issues of race, gender, sexual orientation, and civil rights through the lens of science fiction, holding a mirror to our own society's issues. In this course, you'll watch a lot of Star Trek, and that will be a lot of fun, but you'll also learn about the struggles for civil rights and what constitutes the nature of humanity and personhood.

LAS 1120 Exp America Balance Land Mgt

Experience your America: The balance, controversy, and importance of national land management. This course comes on the back side of the National Parks Service Centennial and major land protests. How does the government impact the land that we have set aside to preserve, enjoy, explore, and more? This course is an exploration into the history of Land management from both a political and outdoor perspective. The many facets of land management will be used as the basis for discussion, debate, and research. The experiential component during this course will be a group project that serves, researches, or explores land set aside for public use.

LAS 1120 Sympathy for the Devil

Have you ever gotten the chills watching a spider crawl on someone's arm? What about wincing in pain when someone else hit his or her forehead on a low-hanging beam? Have you ever identified with a fictional character's struggle you read in a book? The spider wasn't on your arm; the beam didn't hit your forehead, and you're not the character in the book. In each instance, however, you seemed to experience another's suffering. That's empathy, and whenever empathy is lacking, so, too, are the capacity to see others as fully human and the values inherent to a democracy—impossible becomes the affirmation in Article 1 of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights that, "All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood." The recent groundswell of interest in empathy, however, may be due more to our growing unwillingness to understand and share the feelings of another, especially those unlike ourselves. Using an interdisciplinary approach, this course explores the critical role empathy plays in any Civic environment based upon democratic values and in solving increasingly complex societal ills as well as how literature can help us empathically "enlarge ourselves," as Richard Rorty puts it.

LAS 2990 Introduction to Screenprinting (LAS3)

This Course will survey the hand and photographic process of screenprint (aka Serigraphy) and will consist of slide presentations, demonstrations and in and out of class assignments. This course will focus on two-dimensional design principles while making intellectual connections with the printmaking process. Contemporary and art historical issues will be covered, including formal and conceptual issues.

LAS 3110 #On the Road: Travel Writing, Blogging, Instagram, and Digital Writing in Peru

"#On the Road: Travel Writing, Blogging, Instagram, and Digital Writing in Peru," is the final seminar in the Liberal Core Curriculum with a focus on Global Perspectives. It is the culminating course within the Liberal Core Program, building off all previous LAS seminars, and one that will involve high levels of critical thinking. In today's highly interconnected world, the ability to work with diverse individuals, students, colleagues, and communities is essential. In order to communicate effectively with others, particularly those from other countries and cultures, we must understand not only where they come from but also where we come from. This course is designed to help students come to an understanding through the utilization of place, not only to ground us in our mutually interwoven dialogues but to provide a jumping off point into new explorations of the self and "place."

The definition of "place" for this Global Perspectives course is purposefully broad: it includes both global and local, national and international, natural landscapes in the wilderness, encompassing all the objective forms of a place—living and non-living, human and non-human—and, just as importantly, the subjective experiences associated with the places in our lives.

Whether you have traveled or studied abroad or at home, this course asks you to find ways to think and write about your experiences of places in the world. Specifically, we will write about those places important to us by closely examining and utilizing such elements as history, geography, language, and culture (through personal experience and research) in order not just to write more effectively about the places in our lives but also to better understand ourselves and our place in the wider global world. We will consider the journalistic five W's, plus one: Who, What, Where, When, Why, and finally How (the underlying machinations that tie all the above together. We will also explore the role of Digital Writing and Blogging on the Travel Writing Genre. Through close reading of the assigned texts, we will consider the various techniques used by established writers to convey a sense of place, as well as the roles place plays in their writing, ultimately adapting and utilizing these strategies in our own writing.

LAS 3110 Storytelling as Research

This course will examine narratives, both historical and current, to analyze and reflect on local and global issues pertaining to civic engagement and the natural environment. Students will have the opportunity to explore how storytelling can help to promote the common good by allowing individuals to share their lived experiences. Students will practice narrative inquiry by writing their own narratives. Additionally, students will have the opportunity to read global narratives in order to draw connections between the responsibilities humans have to their local civic and natural environments, and their responsibility to global concerns of democratic freedom, human rights, and the natural environment. Students will use what they have learned within their individual disciplines to connect to the greater understanding of the interrelationship between disciplines.

PHO 2990 Basque Immersion

The Basque region of northern Spain and southern France is renowned for its strong ethnic identity steeped in a long history of cultural independence. At the same time, the Basque region also demonstrates an incredibly innovative spirit, evident in its avante garde architecture, technology, and creative arts. Through this course and an intense visit to the Basque region of Spain, students will be introduced to vocabulary, technologies, and practices of the contemporary Basque artistic landscape, and actively practice methods of “looking deeply” at the how these contemporary practices both inform and are informed by such a rich, resolute culture.

PL 2990 The Souls of Animals – Course description coming soon

PL 2990 Satire, Rhetoric & Soc. Change

Satire. Whether it’s lighthearted and funny or sarcastic and acerbic, one thing satire is not is powerless. Effective satire is a rhetorical device; it persuades us to see the world differently. In *When the Joke Becomes Reality: Satire, Rhetoric, and Social Change* students will not only learn about and analyze early and contemporary examples of satire; they’ll leverage those analytical skills to improve upon their own persuasive writing abilities. Students will likewise lean into their own satirical temperaments, composing projects that use satire to comment upon groups, behaviors, and institutions in an effort to persuade their audience to think differently about their worlds.

PP 2990 Intro to Insurance & Risk Mgmt

This course introduces students to the nature of risk, risk identification, general risk management techniques, and the management of risk through insurance. It covers why the individual or corporation purchases insurance, what constitutes an intelligent insurance plan, what products are available in the insurance marketplace, and how those products are regulated.

SM 2990 Theory of OE & Ropes Crse Mgt

This course examines the theoretical basis of experiential and outdoor education including the education, psychological, and historical underpinnings. Time spent in this course is spent in classroom setting and on the ropes course. Emphasis is given to each students philosophical development of leadership and education. The theories of outdoor education and leadership are researched, explored, and discussed in this course.
